#### **Trivia Corner Answer:**

This antique device is a rug beater. Before manual sweepers and before electric vacuum people had to clean their rugs. The rug was hung on a clothesline (we will cover that on another trivia questions) or hung over a fence. The wire formed device was used to beat the dirt out of the rug.

A carpet beater or carpetbeater (also referred to as a rug beater, carpet whip, rug whip, clothes-beater, dust beater, carpet duster, wicker slapper, rug duster, or pillow fluffer, and formerly also as a carpet cleaner or rug cleaner) is a housecleaning tool used to beat carpets to shake dust and dirt out of them. The rug or carpet was hung on a clothesline (we will cover that term on another trivia questions) or hung over a fence and beat until clean. Originally designed by Melville R. Bissell in 1876, it was in common use until the vacuum cleaner became widely affordable.

Typically made of wood, rattan, cane, wicker, spring steel or coiled wire, antique rug beaters have become very collectible. Some wire-formed carpet beaters were creatively shaped like pigs, butterflies, and hearts.
