





Trivia Corner Answer:



Wooden Butter Churn

The tradition of churning butter has been around for over 1,000 years. The earliest documented **butter churn** dates from 6500–5500 B.C. and was found in Israel. Churns evolved from skin pouches to earthenware pots which were rocked, shaken or swung to separate the fat. Later, the dasher, a wooden stick with a blunt end was used to churn butter in a conical wooden vessel. Eventually modern production techniques developed glass and metal churns. The butter churn was primarily a device used by women and children, and the churning of butter was an essential responsibility along with other household chores. Barrel butter churns were agricultural innovations of the 18th century in Europe and operate via a hand crank to turn paddles within the barrel.

Butter churning is the process of shaking up cream or whole milk to make butter, usually using a device called a **butter churn**. In Europe from the Middle Ages until the Industrial Revolution, a churn was usually as simple as a barrel with a plunger in it, moved by hand. The process of churning involves transforming a fat-in-water emulsion (milk) to a water-in-fat emulsion (butter).

The cream is agitated until it ruptures the fragile membranes surrounding the milk fat. Once broken, the fat droplets can join with each other and form clumps of fat. As churning continues, larger clusters of fat collect until they begin to form a network with the air bubbles that are generated by the churning; this traps the liquid and produces foam. As the fat clumps increase in size, there are also fewer to enclose the air cells. So the bubbles pop, run together, and the foam begins to leak. This leakage is called buttermilk. The cream separates into butter and buttermilk. The buttermilk is drained off, and the remaining butter is kneaded to form a network of fat crystals that becomes the continuous phase, or dispersion medium, of a water-in-fat emulsion (butter).
